




In late August 1619, a ship arrived in the British colony of Virginia bearing a cargo of twenty to thirty enslaved people from Africa. Their arrival led to the barbaric and unprecedented system of American chattel slavery that would last for the next 250 years. This is

propose on their romantic getaway to the Galápagos —days before her thirtieth birthday. Right on time.






Portico
